Future tense

Budoucí čas



Will

- **We use will/will not (won't) + infinitive without to:**
- To express a prediction based on opinions, beliefs, or experience,

They will come late, as always.

He will help you with the homework.

- To talk about a decision made at the moment of speaking,

I'll open the door.

Ok, I'll tell you everything.

- To express a promise or intention

I'll help you if you want.

I'll never leave you.



Negative, question

- We use will for the future (tomorrow/next week)

Sue travels a lot. Today she is in Madrid. Tomorrow she'll be in Rome.

Will you be at home this evening?

I won't be here tomorrow.

Don't drink coffee before you go to bed. You won't sleep.

- We often say I think.... I will.....

I think Kelly will pass the exam.

I don't think the exam will be difficult.

We DO NOT use will for things we have already arranged or decided to do.

We are going to the cineme on Friday. Do you want to come with us?

I'm not working tomorrow.



Be going to

- We use be going to:
- To talk about plans and intentions which may still change,

Jane is going to become a doctor.

We are going to spend the holiday in Italy.

- To express a prediction based on something we know or can observe now,

It's going to be a long day for me.

Look at this girl! She is going to fall down!



I'm going to.....

- I'm going to do something – I have decided to do it, my intention is to do it:

Sue is going to sell her old car.

What are you going to wear to the party next Monday?

I am not going to have dinner. I'm not hungry.

- Something is going to happen – we can see now that it is sure to happen:

Look at the sky! It's going to rain.

Oh dear! It's 10 o'clock. I'm going to miss the train.



Present simple and present continuous

- We use the Present continuous:
- To talk about future events we have already arranged. We often specify the date, time and the place.

They are flying to Mexico on Tuesday. (they have already bought the tickets)

I can't come tomorrow. I'm studying for my English exam.

- We use the Present simple:
- When we talk about future event and refer to timetables, schedules, routines, dates.

My bus tomorrow leaves at 2:30pm.

Easter falls at the end of March next year.
